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A Letter from the Pastor: UNDERSTANDING JESUS, THE JEW

I remember years ago listening to a radio talk show host in Pittsburgh talk about how hard it was growing up as a Jew, especially as Easter ap-

proached. Other children in school would give her a hard time, making the erroneous charge that she was a "Christ killer." What she was describing, of

course, was a part of the long, very sad and tragic history of Christian persecution of the lews fostered by the suppression for two millennia of the reality that Jesus was himself a lewish man. It is a suppression that probably began with the Gospels themselves, but that accelerated rapidly through time as the Church became more and more a movement of Gentiles completely separated from its founding among lews.

It is that history that makes the scholarship of Dr. Amy-Jill Levine incredibly important. Dr. Levine, who is Jewish, is also a New Testament scholar, having spent years teaching at the Vanderbilt Divinity School. I first became familiar with her



about fifteen years ago when I heard her speak at the Festival of Homiletics, a yearly gathering of several thousand largely mainline Protestant pastors from across the United States and Canada. She was funny and engaging, but mostly, her lecture challenged me to rethink interpretations of Scripture that I had learned and taught that made lesus into an opponent of Jewish religious practice rather than a faithful member of that religious community. And connection with her ongoing work has had a profound and continuing impact on how I read the New Testament, particularly the

Gospels.

This fall, beginning Sunday, October I, and continuing for six weeks through Sunday, November 5, you

will have an opportunity to engage with Dr. Amy-Jill Levine when we spend six weeks looking again at Jesus' Sermon on the Mount through the lens of her recent book, Sermon on the Mount: A Begin-

ners Guide to the Kingdom of Heaven. The book reads like Dr. Levine soundsfunny in places, passionate, easy to follow. However, we are also going to offer you the opportunity to hear Dr. Levine directly through a DVD that she produced. Details of the study are elsewhere in the Key, but I hope that you will be a part of this, for in focusing on the Sermon on the Mount, we are focusing on some of lesus' "greatest hits" as a teacher through which Jesus provided us with a roadmap, of sorts, for how God wants us to live.



Organ Fundraiser Raises \$96,000

As we mentioned last spring, our organ was in serious need of repair. That repair work is underway thanks to the generosity of many of you. We were able to raise the \$96,000 needed to fund the repair work needed. We hope to have our organ back in a few weeks better than ever. Thanks to all who contributed!

The control system of Central Pres's Schantz pipe organ dates from the same year that Windows NT, and the first generation Intel Pentium processors were released. So it's no surprise that thirty years later, it needed an update. In addition the mechanical components inside the organ console were tired from three decades of

heavy use. On the last day of July this year, we started a project to take care of all these issues. We'll be installing a new Opus-Two Instrument Control System, along with new parts in the console, to bring the organ into the twenty-first century and provide decades of reliable service.



COVID -19 Remembrance Garden Dedication: September 10

We will be dedicating the COVID-19 Remembrance Garden, newly planted on the Maple Street lawn, on Sunday, September 10, at 5:00 p.m. The garden was planted on the spot where a tree was located that was used by the community as a focal point during the pandemic to remember those who were dying,

especially during those months when we could not gather to celebrate their lives. The tree died, unfortunately, and had to be removed, but the ribbons placed on it during that time period have been collected and are buried in the garden. We hope that you will join community leaders as we set aside this garden as a

place where folks can pause to remember, for years to come, the loved ones who died.

Meet Jeff Gaylord— Central's new Moderator of the Board of Deacons.

Sept. 22, 2023: The Great Alone by Kristin Hannah: Historical fiction novel about a desperate family that seeks a new beginning in the nearisolated wilderness of Alaska.

October 20, 2023: Remarkably Bright Creatures by Shelby Van Pelt: An exploration of friendship, reckoning, and hope, tracing a widow's unlikely connection with a giant Pacific octopus.

November 17, 2023: The Violin Conspiracy by

Brendan Slocumb: A "musical thriller" about a classical musician whose family heirloom violin is stolen on the eve of the most prestigious classical music competition in the world.

January 19, 2024: Four Treasures of the Sky by Jenny Tinghui Zhang: Historical fiction novel about a young Chinese girl who must relinquish the home and future she imagined for herself when she is kidnapped and smuggled across an ocean to America.

Feb. 23, 2024: The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams: Based on real events, this novel explores the creation of the Oxford English Dictionary, the misogyny behind it, and its role in our history.

March 22, 2024: **Maid** by Stephanie Land: A memoir about a low-income single mother's experience raising her daughter and working as a maid while struggling to get by.

<u>April 19, 2024</u>: **Horse** by Geraldine Brooks: Told from the perspective of

six characters, this novel interweaves the story of Black equestrians who made their white masters fabulously wealthy with those of contemporary young professionals.

May 17, 2024: West with Giraffes by Lynda Rutledge; Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, this novel explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals.

June 21, 2024: Into the Wild by Jon Krakauer: This mesmerizing, heartbreaking tale is the true story of an enigmatic young man who goes missing in the wild and whose story captured the world's attention.

TREASURER'S COMMENTS

Total income is better than plan through the first half of the fiscal year. This is from regular giving, i.e. pledge donations, Sunday collections as well as other income such as per capita collected and building use (which is primarily from WNSK).

Expenses continue to be managed well and are also below budget in total. Expenses have increased over the same period as last year. This is due to a return to normal church programs and activities. Costs have also increased in general over the same period as last year. Central expects to require additional funds from the unrestricted endowment above the budgeted draw of 4% to fund regular operations during the year.

The Mission Endowment continues to exceed \$3 million even with distributions through the second quarter.

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Central Develops Youth Leaders Via After-Camps

Youth Leadership in the church is critically important - not only because our churches will not exist if we do not engage in leadership development at all ages, but because leadership in the church is one of the most powerful ways that people know that they belong in a faith community. If we can develop and support programming for children and youth that builds capacity for leadership - in the child, in the community of children, and in the community of adults, which nurtures to accepts them—then we have a chance of nurturing not only fantastic leaders who will reach and serve the community in the name of Christ, but also a community of young people who know that their skills and passions matter to God and their church. Young people who lead know that they belong to God.

Central has developed specialty "after-camps" scheduled to run in the afternoons following Summit's CommUNITY Camp VBS, held at Central each July. The after-

camps are run by youth leaders.

The camps originated in Central's Confirmation classes, growing from the confirmands' passion projects. The first was Theater Camp, an off shoot of Anna Jeffries' passion project and her Girl Scout Gold Award project. When Theater Camp turned out successful and popular, more camps were added, with Anna continuing for three more years, and handing over the reins to her younger sister Abby this year.



Will Gawronski and Anderson Wise developed Sports Camp, leaning on their love of sports to share with children who might not be able



to otherwise afford to attend a specialty sports camp.

Bessie Huggins created a Cooking Camp as her Girl Scout project, and is now, after three years, training a new youth leader to take over once she leaves for college next year.



Pastor Deborah Huggins, who oversees Central's Child and Youth programs, said, "I love that kids start volunteering with us in Middle school, and by the time they are in high school they are developing content, and leading sections, and finally taking on a whole camp. I love that the kids mentor each other as leaders. We are delighted to give youth in our community the chance to really lead something - to try something out - to fail, to do better, to find success in an authentic, but also pretty low stress environment. Our youth have lots of support."
