#### A Letter from the Pastor

Beloved.

Thank you for your very warm welcome back to the Central Church family! After 25 years, it is a privilege to return to the staff as your Interim Senior Pastor. It has been a tremendous gift to connect and to reconnect. It has also been a great gift to get to know Central's faithful and dedicated staff.

Since Larrived on February 1, my priority has been to settle in and to make connections with you and the church's leadership teams. I have been grateful for the conversations I have been able to share and look forward to many more. Working with the staff, another priority has been to continue to nurture our worship life together, especially as we have traveled through the Lent, Holy Week, and Easter. In these initial weeks.

there have also been tender pastoral times as we experience the loss of a number of longtime members. It has been a privilege to gather with their loved ones and our community to celebrate their lives.

These first two months have been about entering this season of interim ministry, which we have done together. Our next phase is referred to as dwelling. During this next season, we are to look at who we are at Central Church and begin to dream about who God is calling this faith community to be. Essential to this next phase is listening to you, the congregation. To guide this process, I have gathered a wonderful Mission Task Force Team. They will create opportunities to listen and discern. I will be sending a more detailed letter about this process soon.



The Mission Task Force Team will synthesize the information they have gathered, which will take us into the next season of interim ministry called discovery. A Mission Study report will be prepared and submitted to the Presbytery. Once that report is approved, the congregation will elect our Senior Pastor Nominating Committee and their work will begin on behalf of the congregation.

As we enter into the dwelling and discovery phases of this interim season, we ask for your presence and participation.

#### Meet Our Lay Leaders: Kevin Hill



You may have seen
Kevin Hill in worship,
or his picture in one of
the many articles about
our mission partners—
Kevin is Co-Chair of
Central's Mission
Team.

Kevin's story is one of determination and grit. Having been born in Newark, he describes his upbringing as "challenging", referring to being an only child in a single-parent household with alcoholism and a total lack of family support. From this difficult beginning, Kevin managed to not only graduate high school, but to attend Seton Hall University, and earn degrees from Nyack College, graduating first in his class and becoming a member of the National Honor Society. Kevin holds a bachelor's de-



gree in Organizational Management, and a master's in Organizational Leadership. Kevin was willing to do the work to get a better life, and says, "My family wasn't looking out for me, so God did."

Twenty-eight years ago, Kevin was working in New York City and living in Short Hills, when a co-worker named Dave Sebastian invited Kevin to come to Central and check it out—Kevin did, and stayed.

Over the years Kevin has been a Deacon, and Elder, member of the Mission Team, Liturgist, and served in youth ministry as a Confirmation mentor, going on Bridges Runs, and running the College Scholarship Program.

Kevin tells a story of September 11, 2001 when "God had his hand on my shoulder." His office was on the 86th floor of Tower One of the World Trade Center and he was scheduled to have brunch at Windows of the World that day. The previous week his car was damaged at the car wash, and the only date he could get at the body shop was September 11th. Tower One was destroyed in the terrorist attack that day.

Favorite things at Central for Kevin include the annual Christmas Eve service, and working on the Mission Team. He feels strongly about supporting youth, as he himself has no role models on ethics and how to "adult". Kevin says it is important to uplift others, and when he is feeling down, he immediately goes out to help others.

Kevin loves to watch sports, visit museums, and play golf. He runs his own business—a consulting and corporate advisory practice.

You can see Kevin on HTTV, currently a guest on the discussion show "Community Influencers", an unscripted show about mentoring and adversity.

"You can't let fear overcome you. Be afraid, but do it anyway."

#### Mission Spotlight: Family Promise

Central has a long history with Family Promise—in fact, its founder, Karen Olson, was a member here when the project began as Home First.

Our membership is familiar with the pre-COVID practice of housing families struggling with housing insecurity in houses of worship for a week or so at a time—these families were a common sight at Central for several weeks each year. Where do these families stay now?

The answer is temporary shelter apartments, with support from those congregations who used to host families, and other corporate sponsors. Central has been integral to supporting, both financially and physically, Family Promise's new model.

There are five apartments (in Linden, Rahway, and Elizabeth) used as enhanced emergency shelters. Central has donated

furniture and basic necessities to get these apartments ready for their occupants.

A hosting schedule still exists for congregations—Central's next slot is May 5 to May 12. We are collecting Shoprite and Uber gift cards to support the families—please put them in an envelope marked "Family Promise" and place them in the secure mailbox on the wall opposite the kitchen door. There is also the opportunity for people in our congregation to prepare and deliver a meal during our May host week to any of the families in their Temporary Shelter Apartments. Please contact Francie Cho at YFCho@comcast.net to participate.

Family Promise of Union County provides weekly visits by case workers to each family housed in one of the apartments, and provides support to their residents even after they move on from the temporary shelters, providing rent assis-



tance and help with maintaining their new homes.

Central's financial support of FPUC helps support Family Promise's programs, including the nation-wide Open Table Program where rigorously trained volunteers maintain 12-month relationships with families. and the new Core Table Model where a group of 8 to 10 volunteers (5 of whom have experienced homelessness themselves) work with a family to provide whatever type of support is needed in the particular situation.

Family Promise remains focused on relationships and meaningful experiences. They maintain that of the 2.5 million children who will face homelessness this year,

ALL deserve homes. And Central is helping.

#### **Elizabethport Tutoring Program Seeking Leaders and Volunteers**

Elizabethport tutoring has been a mission and vital program at Central Presbyterian Church since 1969. This program matches service-minded high school students from Summit and surrounding communities (the tutors) with elementary/middle school students from Elizabethport and Summit who could benefit from extra academic help. Our mission is to help these children succeed and build confidence by providing help with homework, building and re-enforcing fundamental skills (reading, writing and math) and mixing in occasional science and art projects.

Leaders begin in August recruiting tutors



by connecting with local high schools, getting in contact with Elizabethport regarding supervisors and students, and ordering supplies.

The tutoring sessions occur every Tuesday evening at the church from 6:45-8:00 p.m. beginning in early October and continuing until early April. A simple snack is provided each week. An orientation/ information session is held in September for any and all interested in becoming tutors, and leaders pair tutors to students. We currently have approximately 20 student tutees and 45 tutors.

Leading this program involves arranging snacks, curriculum, crafts and parties, payroll and security. These jobs may be covered by several volunteers—more hands make lighter work!

We have been run-

ning this program for over 10 years and are now ready to support and guide the next group of volunteer leaders to manage this worthwhile program and continue to build on its mission.

Thank you all for your support of the Youth Mission Trip! We are about a third of the way to our fundraising goal, and we are looking forward to a car wash, restaurant night, tea party, and bake sale still to come.

This summer, Central is teaming up with Christ Church in Summit for our mission trip to Maine. We are excited to repair homes, connect with home owners, and spend time thinking about how we are called into service through faith. We will be staying at the University of Farmington, and serving people in the surrounding communities. Farmington is a lovely college town, with a cute downtown with shops and restaurants.

We will be working with Mission at the Eastward (MATE). Mission at the Eastward has served the rural poor in Maine for decades, striving to keep people safe, warm, healthy, and housed through the cold Maine winters.

During our last trip to Maine, our projects ranged from building a wheel chair ramp, winterizing a trailer, building a deck, and painting a house.



As the kids and families work to prepare for our trip, we ask that you would join with us in prayer- prayer for our leaders and youth as they prepare for the trip, prayer for the joy of making new friends, and working together toward a goal, prayer for the families that we will be serving with, and prayer that we would all grow closer to God.

Central's Lori Donohue said of her family's involvement with our mission trips, "Our 3 daughters all attended 3-4 mission trips apiece. They all found it to be a very valuable experience that enabled them to

bond with other high schoolers as well as CPC adult leaders with all of whom they still feel a special bond. And of course they found the joy in helping others who are less fortunate."

#### TREASURER'S COMMENTS

Total income was better than plan through the fiscal year. This was from regular giving, i.e. pledge donations, Sunday collections as well as other income such as per capita collected and building use (which is primarily from WNSK). There was a bequest of approximately \$185,000 received by Central in September which contributed to the larger than plan income.

Expenses continued to be managed well and were also below budget in total. Expenses have increased over the prior year. This was due to a return to normal church programs and activities as well as persistent B&G needs. Costs have also increased in general over the same period as last year.

Central continued to require additional funds from the unrestricted endowment above the budgeted draw of 4% to fund regular operations during the year.

The Mission Endowment continued to exceed \$3 million with strong investment gains in the last quarter.
