With a start date of May 19, she will take our pulpit for the first time on Sunday, May 25, with a welcoming celebration during Take Ten on Sunday, June 1.



Originally from Islip, New York, Rev, Currás has lived the majority of her life in New Jer-

sey. She attended SUNY Binghamton, where she studied Spanish Language and Literature, and the Princeton Theological Seminary, where she received a Master of Divinity (M.Div.) and Master of Theology (Th.M.). She also has extensive training and experience in the areas of Coaching and Consulting, and Family Systems and Conflict Management/Mediation. She completed her Interim/Transitional Ministry training through a combined program at Princeton Theological Seminary and Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

Rev, Currás served in Guaynabo, Puerto Rico, as Associate Pastor, then in Wharton, NJ, as solo pastor for 17 years. After training as a coach to pastors and a church consultant, she served as Transitional Pastor in Long Valley Presbyterian Church for a few years, before assuming the position of Transitional Pastor at Grace Presbyterian Church in Montclair, NJ, at the tail-end of the COVID pandemic.

Rev, Currás is married to Carlos and has two children, Ben, 25, and Eve, 23, as well as two dogs and a cat. Their bi-lingual home in Sparta also includes her mother-in-law. Rev, Currás loves gardening, walking every day, and trying new recipes. She also writes plays under the pen name Robin Caroline.

#### Gift Card Drive for Family Promise

As you may know, while we are no longer hosting Family Promise guests in the physical church, we are still a host congregation and responsible for helping out during our four virtual hosting weeks each year. Since the onset of the pandemic, the guests have been housed in temporary shelter apartments, and we are welcomed to prepare meals, provide groceries and gift cards, assist with tasks like furniture assembly or help with painting, among other things.

Accordingly, we are holding a ShopRite and Uber gift card collection (\$25 denominations preferred).

Family Promise of Union County distributes these cards weekly and they are an important life line for the families. The Shoprite gift cards are used not only by the families in temporary shelter apartments, but also by graduate families and the numerous families that Family Promise keeps from becoming homeless through their shelter diversion program. The Uber cards are essential as transportation continues to be a challenge

for many families, both current and graduate.

You may drop the gift cards in the church's **ground floor mailbox outside the church kitchen** (from the glass doors entrance, make a right up the ramp and you'll see the box on the wall ahead of you.) Please put them in an envelope labeled "Family Promise".

Alternatively, you may drop them at Francie Cho's house, 27 Beekman Terrace, Summit, in the labeled box located near the front door. Please email <a href="mailto:yfcho@comcast.net">yfcho@comcast.net</a> or text 908-303-6316 if you've dropped cards so that we can retrieve them from the boxes.

The collection will run through Sunday, June 8th.

### Spiritual Discernment—The Art of Good Decision Making

We make hundreds of decisions on a daily basis—ordinary choices about ordinary things... and we are aware of the consequences of these seemingly insignificant choices, but these little choices can literally change the course of our lives.

On the other hand, if you look back on your life and see that there were also momentous choices that propelled your life in irrevocable directions: The choice to break up or marry someone. The choice to pursue this career or that one. The choice to stop smoking or to have just one more...

You know that in some of these choices you practiced good discernment. You know how crucial it is to choose well. And yet we all still struggle and often don't know how to choose.

Spiritual Discernment is finding God in all things. It is a reminder that nothing in the world is separate, and that the earth, the stars, the trees, animals... everything is a sacred ex-

pression of God.

The next time you need to make a big decision or a struggling for answers to spiritual questions, try spiritual discernment—invite God into the process, read the signs and recognize the divine messages placed on your path.

Here is a step by step process by Spiritual Director and author, Teresa Blythe.

#### A Step-by-Step Discernment Process Teresa Blythe

A step-by-step process for spiritual discernment based on St. Ignatius' principles for the discernment of spirits.

## Stage One: The Preparation

- Begin in silent prayer.
- When you think from your deepest, truest self, what is your burning desire in life right

- now? (Keep it concrete, and be as specific as you can be.)
- Write this desire somewhere.
- Reflect on this desire.
  - What do you notice?
  - Does a question for discernment emerge for you? Is there a choice facing you that needs to be made?
- Develop a discernment **QUESTION**. It needs to be relatively concrete and specific. Keep the focus on what GOD is inviting you to be or do. Even if you feel that knowing that is hard to determine. Examples of specific and concrete questions: Is it time to leave this job for another one? Is it God's desire that I get more education? Is God leading me to deepen a current relationship? And if so, in what way?

# Stage Two: Holy Indifference to Outcome

Can you be at peace with whatever God shows you in this discernment, regardless of the outcome? If not, ask God to help with that?

 Do you desire to know what God wants in this situation? If there is a fear or a block, Page 7 The KEY

acknowledge it and ask God for help.

### Stage Three: Practical Considerations

- What are the facts surrounding the question?
- What are the practical considerations?
- What are the options for answering the question?
- Pros and cons for each option?
- What beliefs and values affect this question?

# Stage Four: Considering Intuition and Felt Senses

- In silent prayer (allow at least 20 minutes), listen to your intuition as individuals around the options you face in answering the question. If you need to walk around or stretch or go outside, please do so.
- In silence, listen to your body's "felt senses."
- Make a note of how your body is leaning on this question.
   Write about your "gut feelings."

# Stage Five: Using Your Imagination

- Imagine standing before God to explain the decision you made on the question. Imagine explaining each option to God. What do you imagine God's reaction to be? (Allow at least 20 minutes for the imagination prayer)
- Imagine your best friend is facing this same question. What advice do you give him or her?
- Imagine you are very old and looking back on this discernment.
   What choice do you imagine you would have wanted to make?

# Stage Six: Make the Choice

- You have considered the facts, the intuition, the imagination, and have prayed. Now it's time to make the choice. Search for which way you feel God is leading. What choice feels like the one that God desires?
- As you make the choice, contemplatively sit with and reflect upon the following questions:

- Where do I feel consolation around this choice?
- Where do I feel desolation around this choice?

# Stage Seven: Take the Action & Evaluate

- Reflect on this choice for an appropriate amount of time and see you feel consolation or desolation around the choice. What is the fruit of the Spirit? Continue to keep the choice in prayer.
- At some point, discernment always leads to action. So you have to take the leap of faith.
   Set a time frame for doing that.
- After taking the leap and making the action, notice the early outcome. Does the discernment need revisiting? (It's not a sign of failure if it does discernment is spiritual art and mystery, not science!)
- Keep praying and listening to your deepest greatest desires.
- Keep using principles of discernment for making faithful choices. Tweak the process if need be—make it yours.

#### **TREASURER'S COMMENTS**

Total income is better than plan through the first quarter of the fiscal year. This is from regular giving, i.e. pledge donations, Sunday collections and contributions towards Per Capita as well as building use which is primarily WNSK.

Expenses continue to be managed well and are also below budget in total. B&G expenses exceed plan for the first quarter due to repairs to the heating and plumbing systems. Expenses have increased over the same period as last year. Costs have also increased in general over the same period as last year.

Central expects to require additional funds from the unrestricted endowment above the budgeted draw of 4% to fund regular operations during the year.

The Mission Endowment continues to exceed \$3 million even with distributions in the first quarter.

### **CPC** Weekday Nursery School and Kindergarten

This spring at CPC Weekday Nursery School and Kindergarten was buzzing! The classes were immersed in the transformations they see around them. Many classes are watching caterpillars transform into butterflies, monitoring ladybug larvae, watching



ants build their tunnels and homes, caring for praying mantis eggs, and also spent two weeks caring for eggs and the chicks that hatched from those eggs. The excitement of learning about these transformations was energizing and gave us a collective focus. The children discussed transformation in their learning about Easter with Pastor Deborah.

Each class experienced time in the Chapel learning about the resurrection of Jesus and likened it to the transformations our children have been witnessing this spring.

The first week of June is our last program week at school. The Kindergarteners will perform in the year end play, The Three Little Pigs Opera. The Almost 5's, 4's and even the 3's classes will perform at their year end concerts in the Sanctuary. After the end of the school year, we will be hosting three weeks of summer camp for our current students. Our campers will travel the world by learning about different regions and the animal habitats each day.



Thank you to Central for recognizing the Weekday teachers at the recent Teacher Appreciation Service. I am grateful to lead an amazing group of teachers that provide children a strong start to their educational journey and provide experiences that enrich their lives. It is amazing to witness how the teachers at CPC WNSK carry out the mission that was started within Central over 50 years ago.
