### Lent 2026

Dear Central Presbyterian Church,

On February 18<sup>th</sup>, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. Lent is a time of refocusing ourselves on God. It is a time of focusing on prayer, fasting, living simply and moving closer to God. During this season of Lent, we will share in the Lord's Supper and remember many stories of Jesus' life as He headed toward the cross and to His resurrection.



Lent is a time to repent, to turn - or return - to God, and to refocus oneself on God. There are many ways that one can do this and picking a Lenten discipline, or Lenten practice, is one way. Lenten disciplines involve fasting from something or adding something to your life that has meaning and significance. It means giving something of yourself in a way that brings you closer to God. Lenten disciplines or practices also involve prayer, worship, devotionals, and intentionally reading the Bible in your daily life.

This year at Central Presbyterian Church, our choir will be working on a special Lenten project culminating on Maundy Thursday and we hope you can join us for this wonderful service. I was told once that you can't have Easter without going through the cross and a special way to do that this year is with a powerful and moving Maundy Thursday Tenebrae service. It will be on Thursday, April 2, at 7:00 p.m.

Some other ideas for Lenten practices to do at home are: fast from unkind words, add a letter writing time, fast from meanness, add daily acts of forgiveness, say grace at the dinner table every night, read scripture together, start an intentional prayer time, take a break from Social Media, cultivate a life of gratitude, etc.

I hope you will join us on Sundays for worship as we head through Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and into Easter together.

## Holy Week Schedule

### Palm Sunday, March 29, at 10:00 a.m.:

Palm Sunday commemorates Jesus's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, marking the start of Holy Week. Crowds welcomed him by laying palm branches and cloaks on the road, signaling his status as a king, while his arrival on a donkey symbolizes humility and peace. Palms will be distributed in worship. A Palm Sunday Brunch and Easter Egg Hunt follows.



### Maundy Thursday, April 2 at 7:00 p.m.:

The Lent Choir will provide music for this Tenebrae service. "Tenebrae" is Latin for "darkness" or "shadows," and the service commemorates the passion, death, and burial of Jesus.

### Easter Sunday, April 5, at 10:00 a.m.:

Celebrate our risen Lord with a festival service in the Sanctuary. The Motet Choir, soloists, and guest musicians will fill the room with music, while Pastor Adam Gorman delivers the Easter sermon.

An Ash Wednesday service and disposition of ashes will take place in the Chapel at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, February 18. Classical guitarist Carlos Cuestas will supply music, and Pam Robertson and Pastor Deborah Huggins will lead worship.

As the senior pastor of one of the largest churches in America, bestselling author Kyle Idleman has seen the power of right thinking



- Start getting "unstuck" immediately as you implement simple but profound practices like "Win the Morning" and "Say It Out Loud"


- Understand what transformed thinking looks like in the unique context of your life

## The KEY to the Past: William Ellis, Jr. by Linda Taylor

Every year during the Christmas season, the Motet Choir sings selections from Handel's most glorious masterpiece "The Messiah." When you open the score, there is a Dedication Page saying that these copies were given in Loving Memory of William Ellis, Jr. (Choir Member 1967-1999).



I had the privilege of singing with Bill in the late 80's and 90's and have happy memories of Choir parties and European tours where we shared many group adventures and hysterical meals where we could not read the menus!

I reached out to my friend Noel Werner, Central's Minister of Music from 1995 to 2006, and received the following letter from him to share:

"I remember Bill Ellis as always having a smile and taking great joy in singing with the Choir, even in the face of the difficulties he faced in life. He was so proud when Bill Dembaugh would invite him to sing duets with him during the summer services, and his diligent preparation paid off with a pure tenor tone. Bill was a joy to have along on the choir tours in the 90's, and I know that experience meant the world to him. I remember his exclamation of "Oh No" the night his heart failed him in choir rehearsal in the Sanctuary, Pat Haddon and Mary Moser administering CPR, and his choir family gathering to pray as the EMTs took him to Overlook. He went to heaven that night singing, sent



from the arms of his church family into the arms of God.

I'm grateful to have had this chance to remember his smile and his voice and see some of the photos of his choir tour experiences and to recall the beauty of the Central Church Congregation"


**Our goal: Fill the truck with 5,000 books!**

## Mission Spotlight: Lena Willis Fund

The Mission Endowment Fund, more commonly known as the Lena Willis Fund, was established in 1994 through a \$3-million gift from long-time members Lena and Edward Willis. In Lena's will, she drew special attention to the needs of the homeless in New Jersey. In her honor, the Fund gives special attention to organizations that sponsor programs to alleviate the causes and effects of homelessness.

From inception through 2025, the Fund has contributed approximately \$7-million to numerous local, regional, and international organizations. In 2025 alone, the Fund supplied \$482,044 in contributions.


